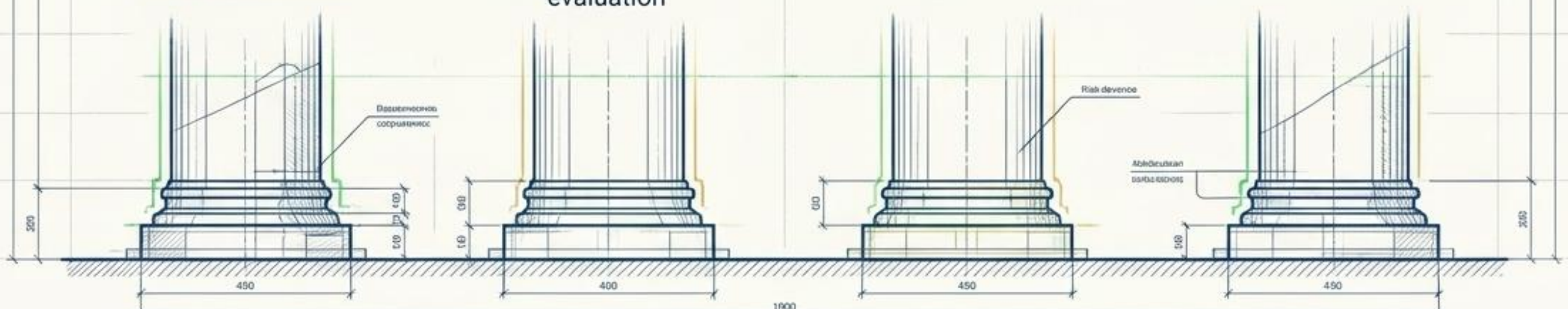

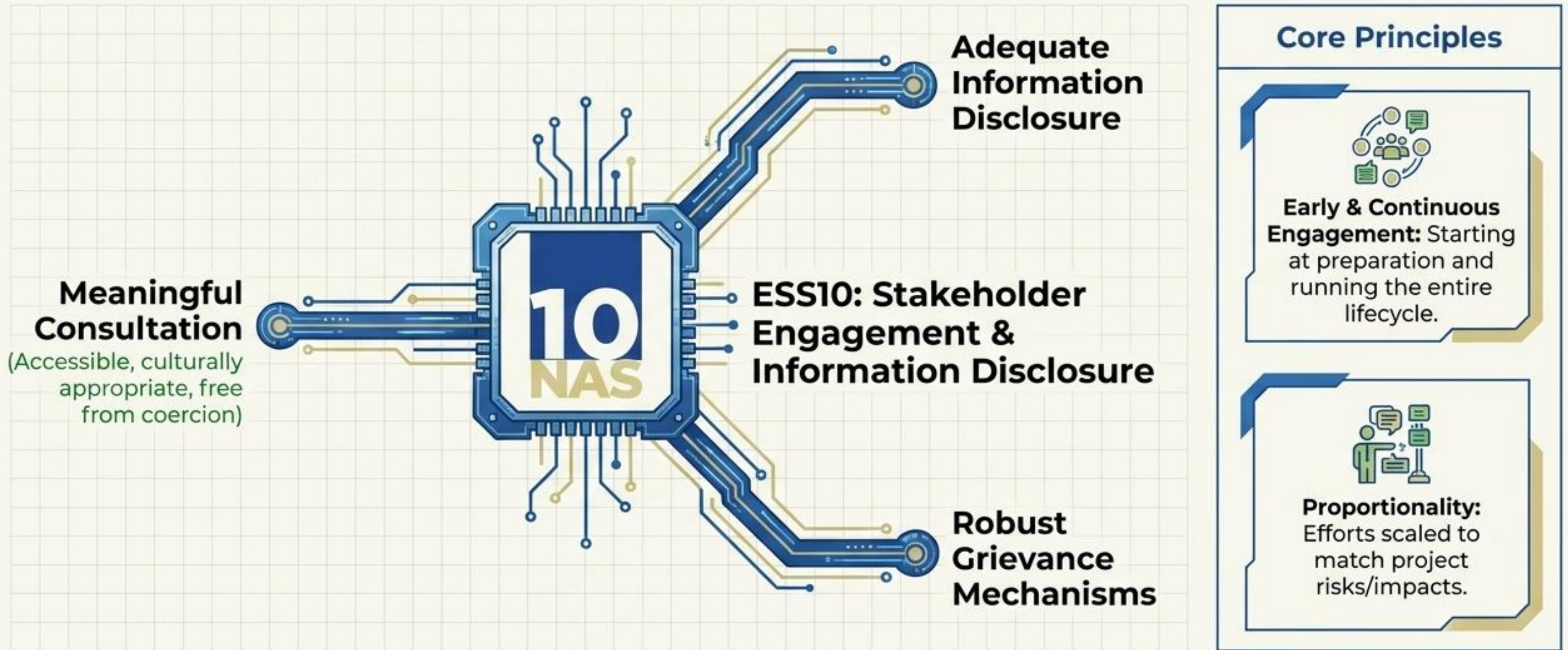

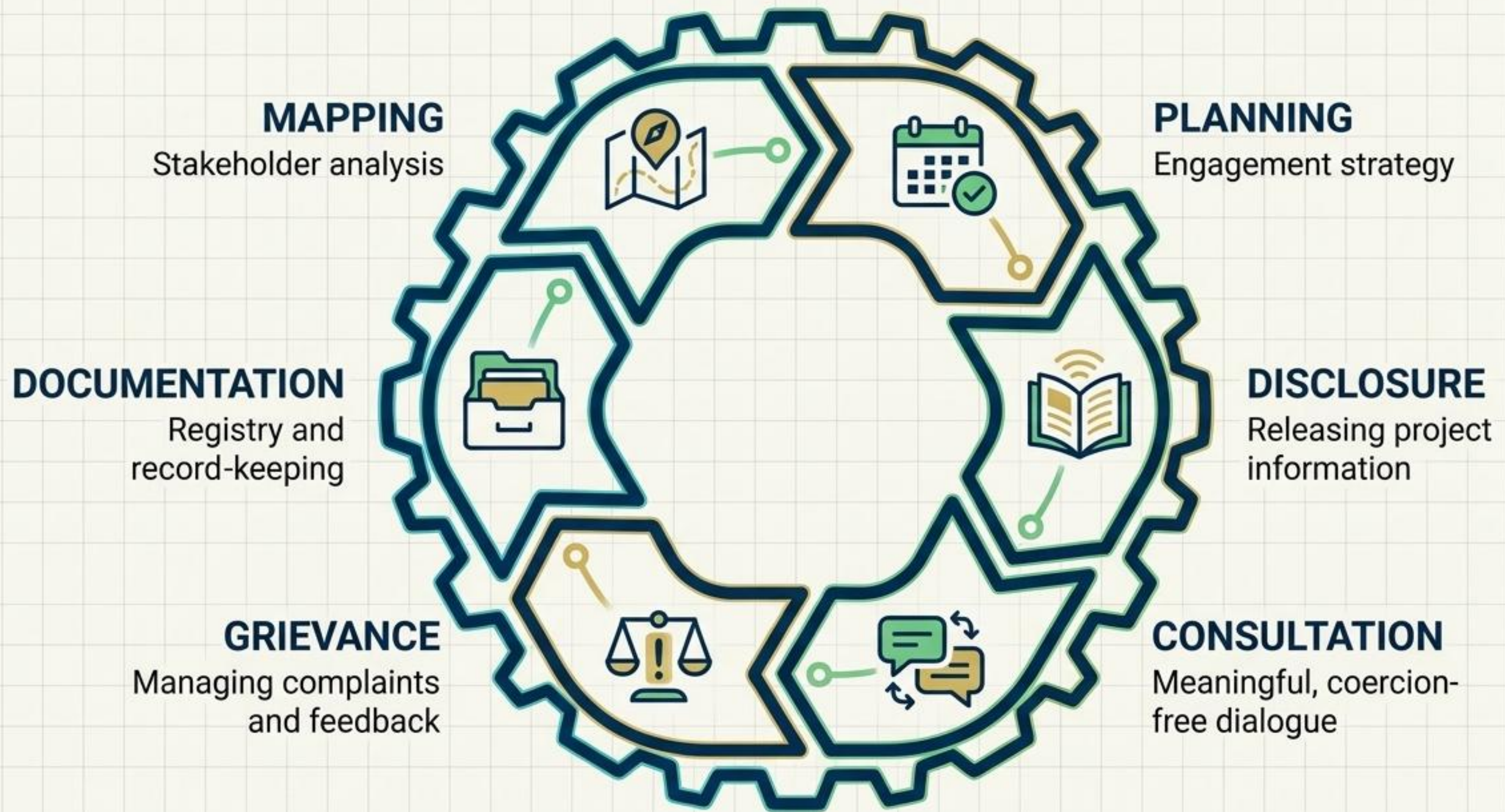

Diagnostic Findings

Brazil demonstrates strong foundations in transparency and grievance mechanisms. High-risk projects require targeted reinforcements to address partial gaps.


 Only 14% of requirements contain gaps.

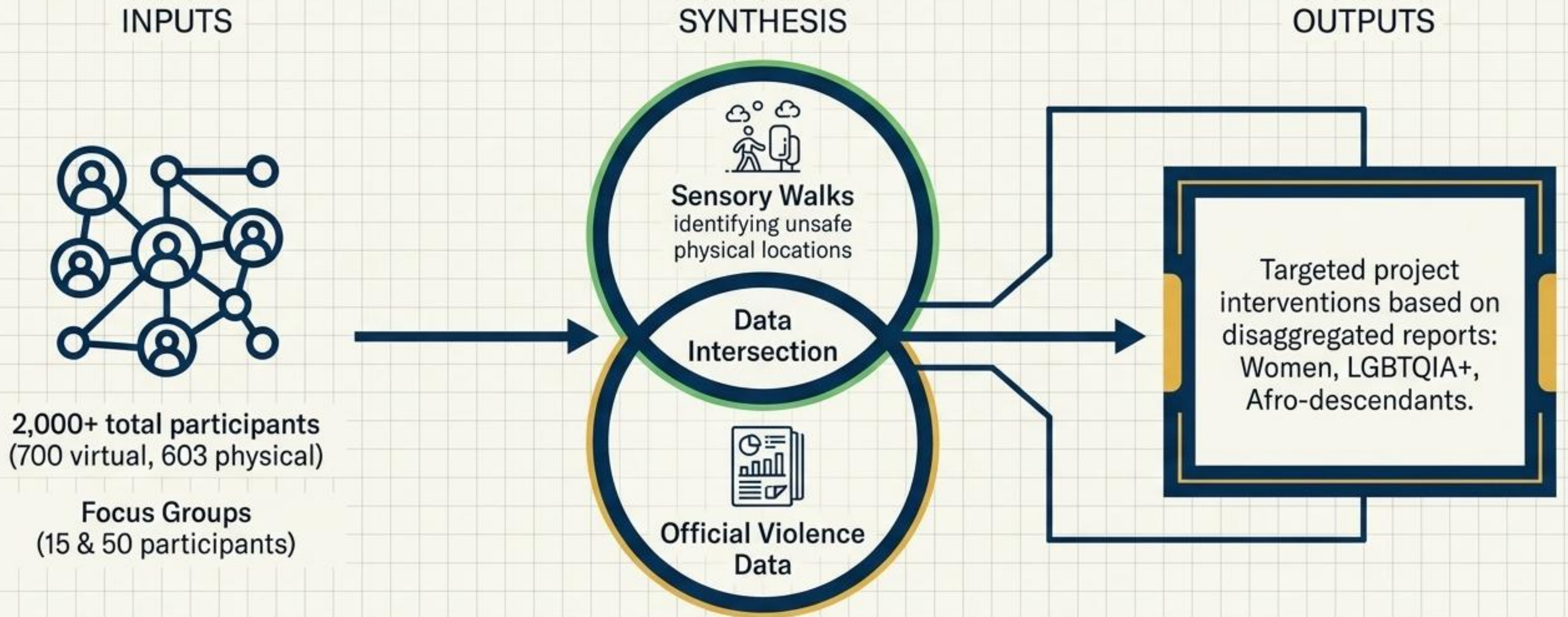

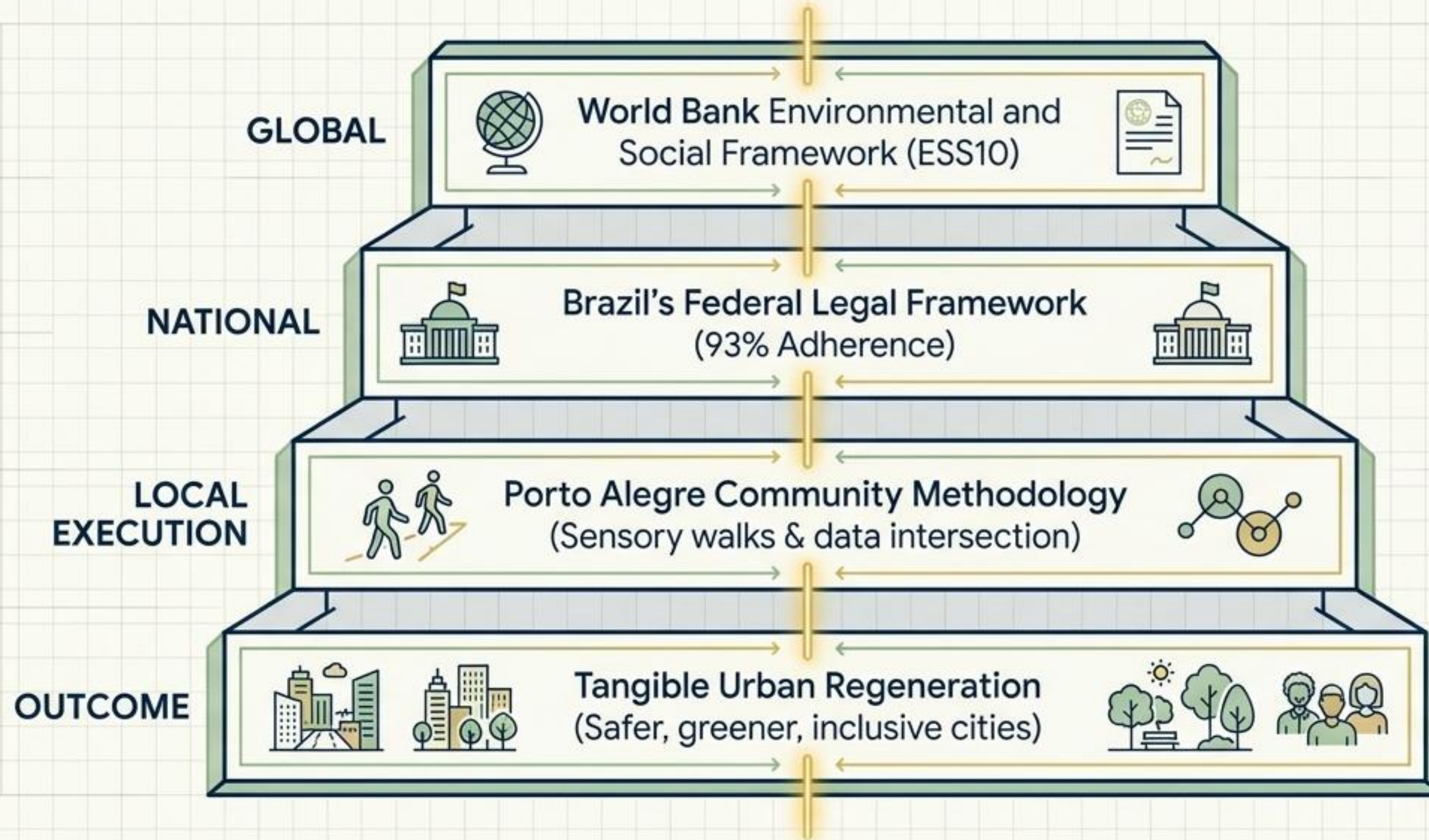


Kilometers of bike lanes rehabilitated and overall increase in bicycle usage.

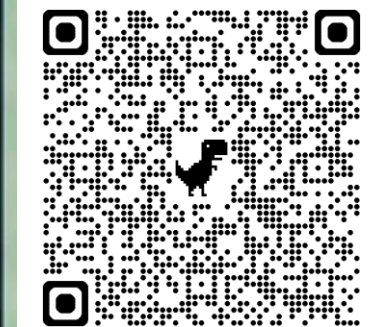
